Coalition Meeting

Outreach Grants - CHIPRA legisla- tion work-group that had been tion has designated \$100 million for outreach efforts. \$10 million is for a national campaign and another \$10 million for Native American entities. The remaining \$80 million will be made available to States. Eligible organizations include: FQHC;s, State Agencies, Faith Based Organizations and other Community Organizations. Applications were due by email on August 6th and by mail on August 10th. Information on those who have been awarded grants should be available toward the end of September.

Packard Grant - This grant was made available to support efforts to encourage agencies to make maximum use of opportunities within CHIPRA. After discussions with Medicaid and ALL Kids, Alabama Arise has decided to concentrate on Express Lane Eligibility processes. This is one of the options that also could result in revenue enhancements being made available to the state. As a first step, Jim noted he would like to re-establish the coali-

This year, ALL Kids has partnered with the sports marketing groups for the University of Alabama and Auburn University It was also noted that to target families in Alabama who may have uninsured children. the sponsorship of a home game setup to distribute ALL Kids materials and talk with families, LED signage, half-time promotions, extensive sports radio coverage, promotions in print materials including the football program and endorsements from the head football and head basketball coaches that will be used as public service announcements for additional radio and television exposure. The partnership is not limited to football. ALL Kids will get the same outreach exposure during basketball, baseball, and gymnastics. The same outreach opportunities will be used at UAB and Troy University. There are over 1 and a half million football fans in Alabama and this outreach effort is expected to be very successful.

Medicaid has been working on issues involving express Lane Eligibility. There have also been discussion about Health Reform and how it will impact Medicaid. It was also announced that after a decision was made to forward mail and verify addresses there was an increase in renewal numbers from 50% to 81%.

ALL Kids

Enrollment—69,252

Enrollment is down but the number of applications received has increased. ALL Kids will be expanding to 300% of the Federal Poverty Level on October 1. Applications received after August 1 will be determined using those new guidelines. Initial estimates are that approximately 14,000 children may be eligible for the ALL Kids program.

ACCF

• Enrollment-About 7000 with 2500 on the waiting list.

ACCF has estimated that a significant number of their enrollment will ultimately go to ALL Kids after the income limit change. It was noted that there have been discussions about what ACCF's program is going to do after ALL Kids' income increase.
