Alabama Prescription Drug Monitoring Program

A tool to deter prescription fraud and abuse







accordance with Code of Alabama, 1975, § 20-2-210, et.seq, the Alabama Department of Public Health (ADPH) has established a prescription drug monitoring program for all Schedule II, III, IV, and V controlled substances dispensed in the state of Alabama or for patients residing in Alabama. Mandatory reporting began in April 2006.

The goals of the Alabama Prescription Drug Monitoring Program are:

- To provide a source of information for practitioners and pharmacists regarding the controlled substance usage of a patient;
- To reduce prescription drug abuse by providers and patients;
- To reduce time and effort to explore leads and access the merits of possible drug diversion cases; and
- To educate physicians, pharmacists, policy makers, law enforcement, and the public regarding the diversion, abuse, and misuse of controlled substances.

Mandatory Reporting

Under the law, only <u>DISPENSERS</u> are mandated to report Schedule II-V controlled substances data. <u>Dispensers include:</u>

- Physicians
- Dentists
- Podiatrists
- Optometrists
- Veterinarians

- Community ambulatory pharmacies
- Hospital (outpatient) pharmacies
- Medicinal oxygen pharmacies
- Mail order or pharmacy benefit programs

System Requirements

In order to access the controlled substances database you must have the following:

- Internet access
- Adobe Acrobat Reader (version 6.0 or above)
- A computer from which you can print
- A working e-mail address
- A professional ALABAMA license
