After each disaster or disaster drill, areas for improvement should be identified and evaluated to understand how the community can minimize the impact of any future disasters. Planning is an ongoing process, and there are basic steps that can help ensure potential risks are identified and mitigated.

Through an evaluation of my Hurricane Katrina experiences (site manager for a volunteer organization in Biloxi, Mississippi), opportunities for improvement will be outlined. Previous discussions have centered on identifying the problems and issues. The next step is to properly evaluate and learn from this natural disaster. When a disaster hits, every second counts.
